

2011 AT A GLANCE

As we start a new year, we wanted to share with you some exciting news about the tremendous impact that your donations have had throughout Lebanon in 2011.

The funding of 9 projects for a total of \$143,000 is expected to benefit 1,540 families and result in 500,000m² of land being properly irrigated.

Completed projects:

Water Pumping Station in Akoura, Mount Lebanon. Installation of a water pump and 400 meters of pipes. This is SEAL's third project in the area, which now allows an entire region to benefit from irrigated agricultural land.

Reconstruction of a Milk Collection Facility in Aytaroun. Restoring the destroyed facility allowed over thirty families to commercialize the milk they produce and encouraged additional milk production.

Refrigerated Truck to Collect Milk from Wadi Khaled. Purchase of a refrigerated pick-up truck benefited 210 farmers who are now able to sell their high-quality, properly refrigerated milk at competitive prices.

Apple Tree Roots in Hrajel, Keserwan. Distribution of 8,230 apple tree roots benefited 686 farmers in Hrajel, whose single source of income is most often the production and sale of apples.

Equipment & Training for a Women's Association in Baskenta. A training session and the purchase of kitchen appliances allowed over twelve women in Baskenta to significantly increase the production of their *mounee* food products, which they sell at local markets.

Projects awaiting implementation:

Water Pipes & Cement Canals in Kfarzebian, Keserwan. Installation of 100 meters of water pipes and 220 meters of cement canals from the springs of "Ellaban" and "El Assal" – allowing the irrigation of 250,000m² of new land for agriculture and benefiting more than 500 families.

Water Pipes in Aynata, Bekaa Valley. After financing the construction of a water well in Aynata in 2008, SEAL funded the purchase of 2,000 meters of water pipes originating from the well. This will result in the irrigation of 250,000m² of land for agricultural production, with approximately 80 families benefiting from this project.

Kiosks in Bkessine, South Lebanon. Purchase and installation of 6 kiosks in a natural reserve pine forest area – a recently rehabilitated tourist attraction – allowing local craftsmen to sell their merchandise.

Cement Canals in Al-Menieh, Tripoli Area. Construction of 300 meters of cement canals used to channel rainwater properly, so as to prevent flooding and the ensuing destruction of the agricultural land, thus improving farming conditions.



Dr. Nabil Husami's Legacy

2011 was also a difficult year, SEAL lost a friend and key member of its group. Up until the very end, Dr. Husami's commitment to SEAL and to helping others was as impressive as it was inspiring. His generosity, uplifting "can-do" attitude, and great sense of humor are part of his legacy to our organization. In 2012, we intend to keep on implementing projects that have tremendous impact on people in need throughout Lebanon; we need as many passionate volunteers as we can get to help SEAL, just like Dr. Husami did.

LECTURE/DINNER WITH MS. ANNIA CIEZALDO

On April 26, SEAL hosted an intimate lecture/dinner with Ms. Annia Ciezaldo who spent five years studying food and politics in the Middle East for her critically acclaimed book *Day of Honey: A Memoir of Food, Love, and War* which offers a fearless, intimate portrait of civilian life during wartime. From secret Baghdad book clubs to family recipes from her Lebanese mother-in-law, Ms. Ciezaldo takes the reader into the heart of the modern Middle East at a historic moment when hope and fear collide.

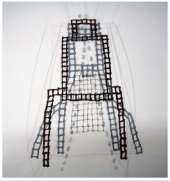
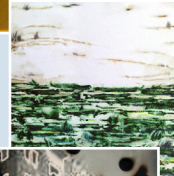
